

College-wide Notes

Business Office

- Facilities supported the moving of select offices throughout the college to facilities the creation of a physically co-located Success Emporium. Moves were completed well ahead of schedule and now all Emporium staff are in a one-stop location to better serve our students and prospective students.
- Construction of Phase I of the Nexus project began on Monday, August 26, 2019. Substantial completion is anticipated to be April 2020.
- Funding request for additional Nexus Phase III funds were submitted in August.
- Reorganization to consolidate services via new Office Support Specialist position, who will assist in business affairs throughout the campus

ENMU Foundation

- Awarded \$9,325 in 26 scholarships for Fall 2019 semester
- Drew 170 shooters to annual AIM HIGH event, with evening banquet, auction and raffle at the Inn of the Mountain Gods
- Raised a cumulative total of \$102,798.43 at our AIM HIGH events

Marketing and Recruitment

- Formation of the Citizens Advisory Council, which met bi-weekly through the summer, ultimately recommending our board to move forward with a \$3 million bond referendum for the next local election.
- Coordinated “Enrollment Round-up” events throughout Lincoln County, and ENMU-Ruidoso service areas. Enrolling students at Ruidoso, Cloudcroft, Hondo Carrizozo, and Capitan schools.
- Partnering with Calvary Chapel and Albertsons Market to bring the Fall “Grill and Chill” to students and community members.
- Released two volumes of the newly published “Elevations,” ENMU-Ruidoso’s newsletter, to registered voters in the district.
- In full-swing of bond election marketing and messaging, including speaking engagements throughout the district.

Records Institutional Research

- Reorganized Research and Records into Institutional Effectiveness and Student Records with three new positions: Director of Institutional Effectiveness and Student Records; Academic/Curriculum Associate; Admissions and Records Associate.
- Implemented new online bookstore solely to accommodate ENMU-Ruidoso students. Follett is partner.

Title V Grant

- Creation of an additional four Structural Fire courses built into Canvas Learning Management System since May.
- Internal Monitoring Team received feedback to create the career specific online resource for the Structural Fire program. The program will be piloted this Fall.

New Mexico Workforce Connection Center (NMWCC)

- \$800,000 awarded the WIOA Youth grant effective July 1, 2019, which will assist youth ages 16-24 to complete their High School Equivalency (HSE), obtain work skills through placement in work experiences, and general life skills.
- Ended last fiscal year obligating \$115,198 of WIOA funding that assisted Lincoln County employers through On-the-Job trainings and students that are pursuing occupations in demand.
- Partnered with the Village of Ruidoso and ENMU-Ruidoso Community Education to assist with funding Village Water Rescue Training, conducted this summer.
- NMWCC was awarded the \$150,000 One Stop Operator grant effective July 1, 2019 – This grant coordinates WIOA mandatory and optional partners to create a seamless service delivery system.

Information Systems and Cyber Security

- Working to improve infrastructure on network services, and internal phone system.
- Improving network security through network cleanup; data loss prevention; automated updates; and, group policy improvements.
- Establishing systems to improve service availability for classrooms; efficiency in software; and, better communication through intranet SharePoint and campus IT advisory council.
- Renegotiated ISP contract, resulting in a significant savings over the previous agreement.

President’s Office

- Submitted bond referendum question for Lincoln County’s local election ballot, requesting a \$3 million bond to fund Nexus Phase II.
- Preparations to submit Perkins V Grant, for CTE funding prioritizing programs that prepare students for high-wage, high-skill, in-demand and relevant careers. This will be year long

- Hosted a retreat with Pattern Energy on developing technical Wind Energy trainings and certificates Mesalands CC attended.
- Successful search for new Vice President of Student Learning and Success

<p>Vice President of Student Learning and Success</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Welcome Ryan Trosper, Vice President of Student Learning and Success, who joined the college on September 3. <p>Math & Science</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> All Math and Science courses are utilizing and the Integrated Basic Education and Skills Training (I-BEST) instructional model to help students overcome initial roadblocks to support challenging courses. Offered a new summer intensive field course: Introduction to Archaeology. 12 students attended, with positive feedback for the course. Several Mescalero students enjoyed the course, stating that the field work in actual dig sites was very impactful. New cohorts of students include: 9 students in Natural Science; and, 13 in Pre-nursing (not including un-declared pre-med). <p>History, Humanities & Social Science</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Dr. Cynthia Orozco awarded 2019 President’s Award for Service and Teaching. Dr. Orozco presented community lectures at the Carrizozo Arts Festival, and LULAC New Mexico State Convention. Ms. Dinah Hamilton attended the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development: International Conference on Teaching and Leadership Excellence. Ms. Hamilton presented at the Ruidoso Lions Club. Ms. Hamilton served on the Faculty Forums during VPSLS candidates. <p>Business and Information Systems</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mr. Steve Miller working with ENMU-Portales on a 2+2 articulation in developing an Information Systems Cybersecurity BAAS Degree. Welcomed new instructor, Juan Gonzales, a Cyber Security Engineer with NASA at White Sands to the IS program. Mr. John McCullough continued meetings with NM Higher Education Department Curriculum and Articulation Committee (NMHEDCAC). The committee evaluates the applications for certification, and re-certification, of general education courses from all colleges in the state. Ruidoso business courses approved by NMHEDCAC as general education include BUSA 1110 – Introduction to Business, with Macroeconomics, Microeconomics and Survey of Economics to be submitted for certification. Adjustments of several economics courses were made to accommodate high numbers of dual credit students, resulting in higher enrollments in traditional low-enrollment classes. <p>Language and Fine Arts</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Jeff Frawley, MFA, was hired as full-time English faculty member and department chair Dramatic increase in English 1110 enrollment compared to Fall 2018 semester: total of 140 students, a 40% increase. In process of hiring new English Literature and Technical and Professional Communication adjunct faculty. Interpersonal Communications (COMM 2120) being offered both online and face-to-face in order to broaden its appeal to students. All sections saw a significant enrollment increase from last semester. Current face-to-face enrollments total 22 students; 	<p>Success Emporium</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Student Services officially reorganized to the “Success Emporium” at the beginning of July. New Emporium and IBEST team members include Monica Gonzalez, Daniel Waldo and Ashley Prelo. Emporium services include: Advising, Financial Aid, Adult Education, HSE courses, ESL courses, Disability accommodations, IBEST instruction, and workforce connections integration. Implemented an early push for student registration. Emporium navigators made calls to hundreds of past and potential students regarding registration. Extended Emporium hours until 8pm and opened Saturdays, 3-weeks prior to semester, to accommodate registration, walk-ins, and advising. Staffed “Roundup” registration events in Capitan Carrizozo, Mescalero, Hondo and ENMU-Ruidoso. Held student orientations throughout week before classes. Approximately 70 students attended. Scheduled one-on-one orientations with 35 new students. Expanded MOU with local high schools requesting the ability to do an orientation on site. Approximately 250 Dual Credit students participated, resulting in positive reviews and less difficulty accessing the ENMU-Ruidoso portal and classes. Completion of TABE Testing Certification by all Emporium team members. Professional development scheduled for later September. Completed training for IBEST Emporium team in Advising, Financial Aid, Adult Basic Education, ESL, and data management for state reporting. Student Services Specialist, Jessica Ortiz attended a diversity and inclusion summit at New Mexico Highlands University. The summit assisted in implementing ways to connect and include students with differing sexual orientations and belief systems, and how to build a Hispanic student support group. The Hispanic student support group is being piloted this semester with Ms. Ortiz and Ms. Prelo’s as sponsors. Volunteer work at the Foundation’s AIM HIGH fundraising event. Ongoing volunteer work with the local food bank to increase visibility and promote community engagement. Partnered with Community Ed to align University 101 objectives to meet general education objectives. Ms. Ortiz taught a pilot class this summer to the Ruidoso Ambassadors and used this CTE class to provide a workforce credential to village employees. Partnered with Workforce Connections to create a cloud based online database to manage all necessary reporting information for the state LACES database, including intake forms, attendance and documentation. Replacement of Accuplacer with TABE testing, to determine if student is “college ready.” Students not meeting requirements are directed into Adult

the online section had to be split amongst the 52 students enrolled.

Community Education and CTE

- Partnered with the Village of Ruidoso Parks and Rec to offer youth apprenticeships training to create the first cohort of Ruidoso Ambassadors. 15 Village employees successfully completed the training.
- Provided First Responder Water Rescue certification to 21 Village of Ruidoso police and fire fighters. .
- Received a Perkin's grant for Quality Matters and Canvas training for CTE instructors in the amount of \$3800.
- Partnered with Region IX to offer a dual credit Teacher Cadet program. Ruidoso, Hondo, Corona, Cloudcroft and Mescalero are participating.
- Offering Dual Credit Culinary Arts at Ruidoso, Hondo, Carrizozo and Capitan.
- Kids College had 25 students. Great feedback, parents are asking to extend the program over the entire summer.
- Hosted the NM Joint Organization on Education- All EMS Training providers in the State. Harlan Vincent, ENMU-Ruidoso First Responder Coordinator was appointed to the curriculum committee.
- Onsite training to Inn of the mountain Gods employees. 65 employees have received and passed the Alcohol Server course.
- Offered EMT-Basic in Capitan- 29 enrolled, 24 successfully passed the National Registry Exam.
- Submitted High Skills Training Report to NMACC, 799 students with 12300 contact hours 18/19- This includes all non-credit live and online workforce training.
- Provided Child Development Courses to Mescalero Employees over the summer, 15 were enrolled fulltime.
- CTE will begin offering culinary arts on campus, Fall 2nd 8-weeks.
- Working with a consultant to develop fermentation science programs.
- Attended the NM Career Technical Education Conference in Ruidoso.

- Partnering with Workforce Connections regarding initial planning and analysis on "Career Pathways," a state initiative to "develop innovative, effective and sustainable career pathways for New Mexicans with low literacy levels and other significant barriers to employment, including individuals involved with the criminal justice system."
- Formalizing a referral process with local law enforcement agencies and preparing MOUs as part of the Career Pathways initiative.
- Completed 2017-2018 State Adult Education report, which included IBEST and ESL reporting.

Learning Commons

- Working to consolidate access to all electronic learning resources available to each ENMU institution, as part of the "One ENMU" initiative.
- ENMU-Ruidoso students, staff and faculty can now access a broad range of periodicals, e-Books and streaming video sources, through ENMU profile credentials.
- Cooperative effort to make 15 Library Resource Guides, describing appropriate resources for research in specific disciplines.
- Development of a general-purpose library research guide for First Year and composition class use.

Distance Education

- Created new instructors Canvas Trainings.
- Current data analysis to determine which courses should be put through a Quality Matters review this year.
