Eastern New Mexico University will offer classes this fall at its new Rusdoto Instruction Center. Initially, the Center will offer freshman and applicance classes in business, art, math, English, Spanish

Registration will be conducted on August 19-23, with the first day of class set for August 28. The Center is governed by the ENMU Board of Regents and the Ruidoso School Board through a joint oper-

aung agreement.

Huge local building given to university

A Texas businessman's donation could have far-reaching impacts on Ruidoso's educational system.

Dale Walthall has donated a 40,000 square-foot commercial building in Ruidoso, the former True-Value Hardware building, to Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU). The building is located at the Sierra Mall off Mecham Road.

The university's board of regents has authorized university officials to undertake steps to accept the gift. The university will now start considering possible uses for the facility.

One possible use will be to house a new approach to education for rural New Mexico, the University Center. The center concept provides a model for a comprehensive set of educational programs, particularly for smaller, rural communities in New Mexico. The pilot project being considered for Ruidoso would build upon the success of ENMU's long tradition of distance education and

on the success of the ENMU-Ruidoso Off Campus Instructional Center, providing even more education programs, including vocational courses, two year associate degree courses, master's degrees, licensure/certification and upper division programs.

This gift could be the cornerstone of the new University Center and would include a core staff for advising, financial aid, library services, high technology classrooms and other courses now offered in the Ruidoso Municipal Schools or other community buildings.

Representative John Underwood and James Paxton were instrumental in working with the University and Walthall in arranging the contribution of the building.

"This gift represents a unique opportunity to further Eastern New Mexico University's vision of higher education," said Everett Frost, President of ENMU. "By experimenting with this new model of a University Center, in service to the citizens of New Mexico in the 21st century."

BANDITS BURN AND KILL IN COLUMBUS

(By Lessed Wire to New Mexicon)

COLUMBUS, N. M., March 9. - A band of Mexican bandits, numbering from 800 to 1,000, supposedly under the personal command of Francisco Villa, raided United States territory, early today. They killed American civilians who exposed themselves and set fire to several buildings. For nearly two hours the fighting continued in the streets. Col. H. J. Slocum brought the Thirteenth U. S. Cavalry into action and shortly after six o'clock drove the raiders back across the border. Eight civilians and six United States troopers were the known dead early today. While the only word given out was that steps would be taken to punish the Villa bandits, it was not indicated whether General Carranza would be called upon to do so, or whether American troops would be sent over the line. Later, American troops crossed the line in pursuit.
