The Mace

Academic maces – staffs of wood, metal or gems – descended from war clubs carried in medieval times by the bodyguards of civil officers. Maces have their roots even earlier than the Roman Empire. Carried before a consul, maces were used to restore order and implement court-ordered rulings. An academic mace symbolizes the authority invested in the president by a university's governing body. When the authority is present, the mace is present. That is why the mace is an integral part of commencement exercises, where students are invested with degrees by the lawful authority of the university. Eastern New Mexico University's mace was designed and crafted by Mr. Greg Senn, art professor, in spring 2007. It is an honor for the mace to be loaned to ENMU-Ruidoso Branch Community College for this occasion.

Academic Regalia

Academic costumes worn during commencement trace their origin to the Middle Ages. Each European college or university had a set of garments that indicated the wearers' status. In the United States, an intercollegiate system of academic costumes has been in use since 1895. The tradition of wearing academic costumes places scholarship above personal preference and current fashion. The academic procession symbolizes the continuity of the tradition of learning and the search for truth throughout the centuries.

High School Equivalency recipients wear a light blue robe or gown. Associate Degree recipients wear a royal blue robe or gown The tassel on the mortarboards are royal blue and orange. Bachelor's degree recipients wear a black robe or gown. The tassel color on the mortarboard indicates the discipline. Master's Degree recipients wear hoods draped down the back of the robe. The colorful edging identifies the field of study.

Candidates for the undergraduate degree wear the tassel on the right side of the cap at commencement. After degrees are conferred, baccalaureate degree recipients turn the tassel to the left side of the cap indicating that they are now graduates.

Graduation with Honors

ENMU-Ruidoso students may earn the following academic honors, which are noted after recipients' names in the program and indicated by honor cords worn with the graduation robe. *With Honors:* Honors are awarded to students who complete their program with a cumulative overall grade point average of 3.5 or better are identified by a gold cord. Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) is the largest and most respected honor society serving two-year colleges. PTK regalia is gold with a navy blue cord. Cumulative GPAs are calculated after the last grading period prior to the student's final

enrollment. Students whose final enrollment grades change their graduation status will have diplomas reordered to reflect the new honor status.

Philanthropy Cords

ENMU-Ruidoso Foundation is offering graduates a special opportunity to wear philanthropy cords during the graduation ceremony. Each cord represents the graduate by his or her classification. The Blue cord honors the New Mexico High School Equivalency Graduates. The Orange cord honors the Associate Degree Graduates and the Silver and Green cord honors the Bachelor's and Master's Degree Graduates. The cords are available to all graduates for a contribution which helps to fund future projects at the College.
